Documenting What You Did – Demonstrate medical necessity and crack claim denials

Overview

In recent years, third-party payers began changing their payment models to reflect value-based criteria. Under these payment models, healthcare providers must demonstrate high levels of quality care, efficiency and effectiveness. A key component of achieving these requirements is medical necessity.

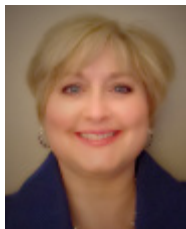
